

The Mubuga Solar Power Station is a grid-connected 7.5 MW solar power plant in Burundi. The power station was constructed between January 2020 and October 2021, by Gigawatt Global Coöperatief, the Netherlands-based multinational independent power producer (IPP), through its local subsidiary Gigawatt Global Burundi SA.

The pioneering 7.5MW solar PV plant has increased Burundi's generation capacity by over 10% and is the country's first substantial energy generation project to go online in over three decades, supplying clean power to tens of thousands of homes and businesses - just before the start of COP26.

After six years of planning and construction, the 7.5MW Mubuga Solar Power Plant in Burundi, the first of its kind in the East African country has started commercial operations, which makes it the country's first substantial energy generation project to go online in over three decades.

President of Burundi Édouard Ndayishimiye officially inaugurated a solar power plant near the country's capital on Tuesday together with the CEO of the renewable energy company Gigawatt Global.

The 7.5 megawatt solar farm increases Burundi's generating capacity by 10%, representing the first substantial energy generation project in the country in more than 30 years. Financing for the project was provided by the UK's Renewable Energy Performance Platform, pan-African private equity investor Inspired Evolution, and Gigawatt Global.
