

Are free solar panels a scam?

How do I avoid solar panel scams?

Knowing about solar scams and what to look out for can help you protect your assets and prevent you from becoming victimized. To avoid solar panel scams, we strongly recommend doing your own research and verifying that your solar company is legitimate before signing any contracts. Take time to make the right decision: Never rush into a contract.

Are solar companies a bait and switch scam?

This is essentially a classic bait and switch scam. A solar company uses the premise of getting 30% off solar to get homeowners to sign a lease or PPA, and then collects it for themselves. In extreme cases, solar scammers may even pose as utility or government officials trying to promote a new or unique solar program in your area.

Are solar leases and PPAs a scam?

What makes a solar company a scam?

Scammers may misrepresent services, make false promises about savings or incentives, or use high-pressure sales tactics to push customers to make hasty decisions. The complexity of solar technology and the ever-changing landscape of incentive programs make it easier for salespeople to exploit homeowners.

Can a government or utility official sell solar panels?

Now, any government or utility official trying to sell you solar panels should raise a red flag because governments and utilities don't sell or install solar panels. The bottom line is that there are solar incentives that can help reduce the cost of going solar.
