

Will Mali get a large solar power plant?

As far as the energy transition is concerned, UEMOA has carried out an installation study for large solar power plants, identifying five sites - which include Mali - for a total capacity of 574 megawatts (MW), to be commissioned by 2030.

Why is Mali launching a 200 MWp solar power plant?

Loading... Mali's President Assimi Goïta has launched a 200 MWp solar power plant project with NovaWind, a Rosatom subsidiary, to address the nation's electricity crisis and promote sustainable energy. The EUR200 million investment aims to supply 10% of Mali's electricity within 12 months.

What are the main sources of electricity in Mali?

At present, thermal and large-scale hydropower plants are the main sources of electricity supply on the national grid. Renewable energy could provide the most competitive form of power in Mali due to today's advanced technological reliability, declining technology costs and high resource potential.

Which company is constructing a new energy plant in Mali?

The Russian company NovaWind, a subsidiary of Rosatom, is constructing the plant, marking a significant step in the country's energy sector. In recent weeks, Mali's transitional government has intensified efforts to implement this solution nationwide.

Is Mali ready to scale up renewables?

The Ministry, working through the Mali Renewable Energy Agency (AER-Mali), has initiated a partnership with the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) to assess Mali's readiness to scale up renewables.

What should Mali do about renewable-based electricity?

Mali also should provide guidelines and standards to accommodate renewable-based electricity. Consultation with relevant stakeholders is crucial, since grid connection codes impact on all those involved in the power system. By engaging the relevant parties, codes will be able to be implemented without placing the system in jeopardy.

The Fana Solar Power Station is a planned 50 MW (67,000 hp) solar power plant in Mali. The power station is in the development stage, under concessional terms by the company Legendre Energy, a subsidiary of the Legendre Group, a French conglomerate, under a public private partnership arrangement.

Mali could learn from best practice of other hydropower-reliant countries like Brazil and Colombia, where solar and wind power offset dry-season shortfalls. The resulting power system flexibility effectively lowers dependence on fossil-fuel imports and reduces GHG emissions.
