

How much money does Puerto Rico have to pay for solar?

Up to \$190 million is available to Puerto Rico's Housing Administration and a private company to pay for solar and battery installations in public housing common areas and subsidized, multifamily housing properties. Another \$175 million is available for certain healthcare and dialysis centers.

What is the Puerto Rico solar access program?

The Solar Access Program is funded by the U.S. Department of Energy's Puerto Rico Energy Resilience Fund. For far too long, Puerto Ricans have lived with an unreliable and expensive electric system.

How much solar power does Puerto Rico need?

It would add up to 200 megawatts of solar generation and another 285 megawatts of storage capacity to Puerto Rico's grid, according to U.S. Energy Secretary Jennifer M. Granholm. The solar photovoltaic project is expected to generate about 460,000 megawatts of energy, enough to power some 43,000 homes, officials say.

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) -- The U.S. Department of Energy announced an \$861 million loan guarantee on Wednesday to build two solar photovoltaic farms in Puerto Rico as persistent power outages plague the U.S. territory.

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The Puerto Rico Office of Management and Budget will lead a coalition of four other partner organizations to install solar and storage systems that will provide an economic benefit to thousands of low-income and disadvantaged households and make their power sources more resilient to storms.

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DOE selected three qualified solar companies with an existing workforce in Puerto Rico as well as five qualified nonprofits and cooperatives across the region to begin award negotiations for a total of \$440 million to deploy residential solar systems to vulnerable Puerto Rican households.

"The microgrid is a major step in taking Puerto Rico from the vulnerability of the centralized fossil fuel system to the aspiration that I think we share in Puerto Rico," says Arturo Massol-Deyá, associate director of Casa Pueblo. "To use [renewable] fuels and generate power at the point of consumption, where it's
