Does Trinidad & Tobago need energy subsidies?

Unlike many island nations, Trinidad and Tobago has significant oil and natural gas reserves and is a net exporter of these fuels. However, subsidies for domestic energy consumption have created a fiscal burden on the government that could be reduced through the expansion of alternative transportation fuels, energy efficiency, and renewable energy.

Who owns the energy in Trinidad & Tobago?

In 1994, it divested from its generation holdings on the larger island of Trinidad and now purchases energy from three Independent Power Producers (IPPs): the Power Generation Company of Trinidad and Tobago, which purchased the former T&TEC-operated plants and presently controls 1,386 megawatts (MW) of gas-fired capacity across

Does Trinidad and Tobago have coal?

Trinidad and Tobago has no coal reserves and produces no coal. As of 2016, the country consumed 198 tons of imported coal annually, ranking 125th in the world for coal consumption. Trinidad and Tobago is an oil and gas based economy, whose major exports are hydrocarbons, petroleum and petroleum based products, and liquefied natural gas.
